# Chapter Named Among Top Fundraisers for PiKA, Recognized for Outstanding Undergraduate Support

The Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation recently published the Honor Roll of Donors for January 1, 2015 to December 31, 2015. Donations made to the Foundation support the undergraduate members of our fraternity with programming and services provided to the chapters and the PIKE University educational platform.

### Beta Pi among Top Fundraising Chapters

We are proud to announce Beta Pi's outstanding fundraising results for the Foundation:

- Beta Pi ranked first in the category "most donors per chapter," boasting an impressive 47, which is superior to the second-ranked chapter with 38 donors.
- In the "most dollars raised per chapter" category, Beta Pi ranked second with \$190,239. The chapter in third place raised \$114,323.
- Beta Pi also finished second in "most dollars pledged per chapter." Our total of \$55,800 greatly outweighed the chapter in third place, whose total was \$27,101.

These lofty rankings, and the fact that our Chapter beat out many much larger chapters, are a real testament to the positive experience our members have at Beta Pi. We are proud to have so many generous alumni among our ranks—all of whom were listed on the Honor Roll.

### **Supporting our Undergraduates**

Beta Pi is also leading the way by supporting our undergraduates through our endowment fund and individual scholarships.

According to the Pi Kappa Alpha Annual Report 2015, we have the largest Chapter Endowment Fund (CEF) of all chapters and colonies. As of December 31, 2015, Beta Pi's CEF totaled \$141,968. The CEF is used to offset certain expenses that our undergraduate members incur when attending PiKA conferences and PIKE University, therefore, it is a critical fund to furthering the experience for our members.

Beta Pi also sponsors four individual scholarships:

# Harvey Mackler '72 Discovers True Power of Brotherhood

How PIKE Brothers Continue to Help Him in His Fight Against ALS

Harvey Mackler's fundraising work to support ALS patients—as well as his commitment to PiKA—is a well-known story, but we recently caught up with him to learn about his most recent progress and how Beta Pi brothers are contributing to his success.

If you haven't been keeping up with Harvey's work, now is your chance to learn more and find out how you can make an impact.

"He's all our brother, I just happen to be a biological brother," says Harvey Mackler '72. He's talking about Scott Mackler M.D., Ph.D, '77, a physician-scientist at UPenn's Pearlman School of Medicine who died in 2013 from complications of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), also known as Lou Gehrig's disease.

Both brothers were embraced by the Pike community after Scott's diagnosis. "It did help resurrect a lot of old friendships," Harvey says, noting that many of the alumni were connected through a Yahoo group organized by Joel Catania '71. Harvey leaned on that support to help establish the Scott Mackler 5K Run/Walk. Scott was a serious athlete prior to his diagnosis—he played soccer at Penn and participated in both the Boston Marathon and the New York City Marathon. Harvey established the event to raise funds for the ALS Association of Greater Philadelphia's Scott A. Mackler Assistive Technology Program, which provides patients with the necessary tools to live independently.

"We've had unbelievable participation from the brothers," Harvey says. "The first year, I went

out to alumni brothers who were interested in Scott and asked if they'd pledge a certain amount for every kilometer that a Pike walked."

After receiving an enthusiastic response for pledges, Harvey directly invited the entire membership of two local undergraduate chapters to the walk, resulting in more than 100 Pikes that first year. Close to \$19,000 was raised, and the brothers who pledged without expecting such a response made good on their donations. "It reaffirmed my belief and partnership with the fraternity," Harvey says.

The memorial walk/run has become somewhat of a reunion for Penn Pikes, with several alumni traveling from the New York and Virginia areas to attend with current members of the Beta Pi chapter, who charter a bus from campus for the event. Harvey gets checks from alumni going back several decades who want to contribute in Scott's memory.

While much of Harvey's philanthropic work is focused on ALS-related funds, he's made sure that Scott's legacy lives on at Pi Kappa Alpha through two recently-established scholarships. The Scott A. Mackler Medical School Memorial Scholarship provides a \$3,000 per year award to any Pike who is already attending or plans to attend medical school. The Scott Mackler True Grit Award is specific to Beta Pi and provides an undergraduate "who gives 110 percent," in Harvey's words, a \$750 award. Both awards are administered by PiKA national, which promotes and reviews applications for the recognition. The first awards for both funds were made during the past years.

"It was important to have these scholarships through PIKE because we were both firmly committed to it," Harvey says. "One of my goals is to encourage others to do the same."

Looking back on the brotherhood, Harvey believes that the lasting friendships of the fraternity are its most valuable benefit. It's something that he's learned both during his time at Beta Pi and, more importantly, in his experience as an alumnus who's gained so much from his brothers, both Greek and biological.

He then did two years of surgical training at (then) Cornell Medical/New York Hospital, one year of research in the Department of Orthopedic Surgery at Albert Einstein/Montpelier Medical Center, and then four years of Orthopedic Surgery Residency, graduating in 1994.

Those years were followed by a one year fellowship in Foot and Ankle Surgery at the Hospital for Special Surgery.

Today, John is in private practice at Orlin and Cohen Orthopedic Associates. Having been there since 1995, he's an original partner in the group that has grown to eight offices in Long Island, NY. He's also been able to share his knowledge, having held teaching positions at Northwell Health, New York Hospital Queens, South Nassau Communities Hospital, and St. John's Hospital.

Though his studies are what got him where he is today, John's success is also due, in part, to his PiKA experience. That's why he still gives back to Beta Pi.

"My fraternity experience enriched the academics at college," he says. "The social aspect of living and working in a group helps develop interpersonal skills that are valuable in all real life situations."

He also attributes his success to exposure to other brothers' areas of study. If it weren't for the fraternity, John may not have been surrounded by such a unique group of individuals with different skills, which taught him valuable lessons outside of the medical world.

"My non pre-med classes were concentrated in business courses in the Wharton School and my roommates at PiKA, **David Berkman '80** and **Greg Sembler '80**, are both successful businessmen," he says. "That background and exposure has been invaluable in growing an Orthopedic Surgery practice in a challenging healthcare landscape. I have tried to duplicate the comradery, organization, and competition from my PIKA experience in my practice."

John stays in touch with the brotherhood through Slices of Beta Pi and emails. He's also grateful for the efforts of Jeff Kaufman and Ross Weiner, who organized the annual dinner in NYC for '80s brothers.

"Several of my brothers also live in Westchester where I grew up and have overlapped with some childhood friends," he says.

John's also passed on a passion for the fraternity experience to his children, likely because they've accompanied him to homecoming football weekends and had opportunities to visit the fraternity house in the past.

"Currently, my oldest son is a sophomore at Duke and is in a fraternity too," he says. "My youngest son is a junior at Syosset High school and will be applying to college in the fall. U of Penn is high on his list."
